Sexual health & com



I am delighted to introduce the 2020 Annual Report on behalf of the clients, volunteers, staff, stakeholders and Board of Directors of the Sexual Health Centre.

The year 2020 brought drastic and disruptive changes to everyday life in Ireland. While these changes demanded an adaptive response to the delivery of our sexual health services, the Centre remained driven to meet the community's needs. These included supporting people living with or affected by HIV, ensuring widespread accessibility to screening and reproductive health support, increasing individual capacity to engage in healthy relationships, and promoting positive sexual health and wellbeing for all.

Having a collaborative approach to our work is imperative, in order to provide accessible sexual health services, particularly for those in marginalised and/or vulnerable settings. As part of Ireland's first sexual health network, the Centre began the year by co-Health Conference. hostina Sexual highlighting the various sexual health resources available in Cork, in February 2020. Toward the end of 2020, the Sexual Health Centre led a virtual World AIDS Day Run in conjunction with the HSE Sexual Health and Crisis Pregnancy Programme. The event promoted the U=U message and highlighted the need for everyone to know their HIV status while following Government guidelines.

In March 2020, sexual health issues experienced by clients were exacerbated by the impact of the pandemic, and the staff of the Centre worked tirelessly to counteract this. Clients reported concerns such as accessing contraception, including condoms,

difficulties in relationships, worries about HIV treatment and testing. This has been a clear indicator of the community's need for responsive, high quality, professional and inclusive services. The Centre evolved to provide remote support in the form of counselling, health promotion workshops, information campaigns, a condom mail-out service and helpline.

In line with our five-year strategic plan, and in response to the pandemic, the Sexual Health Centre provided sexual health services online and over the phone and produced a range of user-friendly publications and online resources.

While the Centre's testing and drop-in services were suspended for some months, they resumed at the Centre during the summer. A number of new services were introduced at the Sexual Health Centre with a view to further improving the sexual health outcomes of the growing Cork community, including the Sex and Love Therapy (SALT) programme, the WISE e-learning platform, and the Sexual Health Hubs for young people.

Building on old and new partnerships is of great importance to the Sexual Health Centre. By establishing relationships and collaborations with statutory and non-statutory agencies, the Centre has been able to better support the sexual health needs of an evolving Ireland. The Centre's team members remain key collaborators and stakeholders on a number of national and local policy implementation groups.

The important work of the Sexual Health Centre would not be possible without the commitment of the staff, volunteers and board of the organisation. I would like to extend my congratulations to the team in delivering a range of innovative responsive services and campaigns, in 2020. Their commitment to the provision of high quality, equitable, accessible and inclusive sexual health services is crucial to ensuring individuals' right to a positive everu healthcare experience.

OUR PURPOSE

The Sexual Health Centre is a Not for Profit, Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) that was established in July 1987 as Cork Aids Alliance. The vision of the organisation is for a future where sexual health is recognised as an integral part of life, barriers to accessing sexual health services are removed, social stigma and discrimination are challenged, each individual feels safe to express their sexuality, and people make informed decisions regarding their sexual wellbeing and treat each other's life choices with the utmost respect.

In achieving this, the Sexual Health Centre sets a mission to:

"[A]lways provide the most up-to-date and comprehensive information regarding the topics of sexual health, wellbeing and sexuality, to offer a safe space for individuals to express their concerns without fear, to get non-biased answers to their most intimate questions, to normalise the perception of sexual health and sexuality and to facilitate a nation-wide acceptance of positive sexual health and sexuality as an integral part of life."

Our values include Dignity, Confidentiality, Accessibility, Safe Space, Non-Bias, Partnership, Transparency and Quality. The Sexual Health Centre believes that everyone has a right to positive sexual health and aims to provide high quality, inclusive and client-focused services. These services relate to wellbeing, healthy relationships, HIV and sexual health, and are available to every member of the community.

For over 30 years, the Sexual Health Centre has supported the community through innovative initiatives and an adaptive team, and it will continue to do so in the future.





The Sexual Health Network, of which the Centre is a founding member, kicked off 2020 with its first Sexual Health Conference in Cork City Hall, to highlight the various sexual health resources available in Cork. Shortly after, in March 2020, the Sexual Health Centre team began remote working.

The team were acutely aware of the ripple effects the pandemic would have on people's sexual health. While adhering to government advice and navigating remote working, the Centre successfully adapted its services with innovative delivery formats and new initiatives.

The Centre's counselling, mentoring and support services continued with clients by phone and video call. The health promotion team provided virtual workshops and practical support to young people, LGBTI+ people and members of marginalised communities, as well as professionals and the wider community.

A condom postal service was immediately launched by the Sexual Health Centre whereby condoms were mailed, free of charge, to clients across the country. The Centre's Communications team ensured that the public had access to accurate, timely information by producing a number of awareness-raising campaigns, including information on sexual health service updates and guidance on issues that arose following the COVID-19 outbreak along with new blog posts and a newsletter.

Following the success of the 'WISE' training programme in 2019, the Sexual Health Centre's 'WISE Online' e-learning platform was developed, trialled and launched in 2020. 'WISE Online' was created to assist professionals in facilitating and responding to questions on sexual health and relationships from young people. The programme was officially launched by Minister for Children, Disability, Equality, Integration and Youth, Roderic O'Gorman TD, with over 170 participants registered for the launch, which was broadcast on Zoom.

The Sex and Love Therapy programme, led by Donal Clifford, transferred into the organisation in 2020. This customised group therapy programme supports people with concerns in relation to problematic sexualised behaviour and is a further resource to support the sexual wellbeing of the Cork community.

The Centre rounded off the year with a social marketing billboard campaign by the Sexual Health Network. The '#AFewHomeTruths' campaign raised awareness about sexual health issues affecting people in Cork, and signposted to the relevant support services.



THE YEAR IN REVIEW ctd.

By continuing to build on partnerships with local, national and international organisations, the Sexual Health Centre has been able to contribute significantly to the advancement of Cork's sexual health service provision. This approach has been particularly important in ensuring that the community's needs are met during the pandemic.

In collaboration with Cork ETB and Youth Work Ireland Cork (YWIC), Ireland's first community-based Sexual Health Hub for young people was launched by the Sexual Health Centre to ensure sexual health information is easily accessible to youth along with appropriate training for youth workers. The Sexual Health Centre collaborated with GOSHH (Gender, Orientation, Sexual Health, HIV) and SWAI (Sex Workers Alliance Ireland), on the production of a COVID-19 information card for street-based sex workers who, out of necessity, continued working during the pandemic. This card was developed in cooperation with street-based sex workers and contains practical advice to try to minimise the risk of transmission while at work.

To ensure that the Centre continued to battle HIV stigma, the annual World AIDS Day Run was moved to a virtual event in light of restrictions. The Sexual Health Centre hosted a virtual, national run in conjunction with the HSE Sexual Health and Crisis Pregnancy Programme. Established in 2018, the World AIDS Day run has been previously delivered in partnership with parkrun, the Health Service Executive, Healthy Ireland and sexualwellbeing.ie. The virtual event facilitated participation all over the country, tackling HIV stigma in each participant's local community with the U=U message, and encouraging people to test regularly.








ENQUIRIES

In 2020, we saw a total of 4,260 enquiries from clients, primarily via email, phone and social media. An online form for condom orders and a chatbot were incorporated on to our website, to enhance ease of access for clients. Our helpline service continued remotely; ensuring that clients without internet access could easily avail of sexual health services and support.





LGBTI+ SEXUAL HEALTH SUPPORT


The Centre's LGBTI+ Sexual Health Support Worker provides a professional mentoring service to members of the LGBTI+ community and their loved ones. In 2020, a total of 92 support sessions were provided - a 37% increase in demand from 2019. For the first time, the Sexual Health Centre provided support to clients via geosocial apps such as Grindr.



HIV SERVICES

HIV Counselling

The Sexual Health Centre provides professional counselling, tailored to the experiences and needs of people living with HIV. In 2020, we facilitated 460 counselling sessions around HIV. See below the age range of new clients from 2020.



HIV Support


The Sexual Health Centre's HIV Support Worker continued to provide important practical support and mentoring to people impacted by HIV. In 2020, 97 HIV support sessions took place. As with all of the Centre's counselling and support services, phone calls and Zoom video calls were often used.






The Centre offers free rapid HIV testing, both on-site and in community settings. In 2020, we provided 178 rapid HIV tests, as part of a partnership project with organisations across the city. This testing service is supported by volunteers as well as the Centre's health promotion and outreach workers. Due to the pandemic, the testing service was suspended for several months, and was run solely from the Sexual Health Centre by appointment only for the remainder of the year.

HEALTH PROMOTION 🔼

Our team delivered a variety of tailored workshops during 2020. In order to support client capacity throughout the pandemic, virtual service delivery became an aspect of health promotion. Client groups supported during the year included third-level educational establishments, direct provision centres, migrant centres, youth centres, non-mainstream schools, groups within the disability sector and the travelling community.



Condom distribution



The Sexual Health Centre distributed 16,980 condoms in 2020. This included a new mail-out service, whereby condoms and lubricant were posted to client's homes. The Centre worked with its partners such as the Movement of Asylum Seekers in Ireland (MASI), Sex Workers Alliance Ireland (SWAI), the Cork Simon Community, Edel House, and others, during lockdown to ensure condoms were made available and accessible. The "bag" service for individuals engaged in sex work was also made available by post throughout the year.




CRISIS PREGNANCY SERVICES

We provide a non-judgmental, wrap-around and free service, ranging from pregnancy testing to all-option crisis pregnancy counselling, as well as post-termination counselling and support. In 2020, the Centre provided a total of 426 sessions, inclusive of crisis pregnancy counselling, post-termination counselling and pregnancy testing.

Crisis Pregnancy Services - Age groups of new clients










ONLINE PRESENCE



Social media has become an increasingly important tool for the Sexual Health Centre to connect with our clients. We use online platforms to provide news about our services and general sexual health information, as well as appointment bookings and advice. While virtual service delivery has brought significant challenges, including limitations to outreach work, the Centre's team was determined to use online communications to serve the community as effectively as possible.





The Sexual Health Centre introduced an online condom order form, and chat function at sexualhealthcentre.com, so that clients can contact the Centre quickly and conveniently. A number of <u>pandemic-related information campaigns</u> were published on the Centre's website and social media. For the first time, the Sexual Health Centre provided an online blog, newsletter, and health promotion outreach on geosocial apps such as Grindr.



As well as conducting regular staff meetings via Zoom, a number of virtual workshops and webinars were hosted for the wider community by the Centre's Health Promotion team. These included capacity-building workshops such as 'The Naked Truth' series with UCC Feminist Society and the 'Screenage Kicks' webinar series for professionals working with young people. Workshops were recorded with subtitles, to maximise accessibility.























WORLD AIDS DAY CAMPAIGN 2020 🧣



Over 600 participants joined the World Aids Day run on 28th November. The run was supported by the Lord Mayor, Cllr. The Sexual Health Centre is very grateful for the support of its funders, and was fortunate to be successful in a number of applications in 2020, including the below initiatives:

WISE Online

This evidence-based E-learning platform assists professionals in responding to questions on sexual health and relationships from young people. The development of WISE Online was funded by the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth.

A Few Home Truths

The Sexual Health Network, of which the Sexual Health Centre is a proud co-founding member, ran a social marketing campaign in December 2020, with the support of Cork City Council, Healthy Ireland, the Government of Ireland, and Cork City Local Community Development Committee. This campaign ran on billboards in Cork city and on social media, under the name 'A Few Home Truths', to raise awareness of the variety of sexual health issues and services impacting the Cork community.

Youth-oriented building renovation

Funding from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (formerly DCYA), via Cork ETB, enabled the Sexual Health Centre to develop its premises. The Centre's reception has been renovated to better facilitate drop-ins from young people.

SHIFT - Sexual Health Information For Teens

The Sexual Health Centre was grateful to receive LGBTI+ Dormant Account Funding via Cork City Council and Cork City Local Community Development Committee, on behalf of the Department of Rural & Community Development. This scheme enabled the Centre to develop, print and distribute an inclusive sexual health resource for young people in Cork.

DASH - Drugs, Alcohol and Sexual Health

In partnership with the Cork Local Drug & Alcohol Task Force, and supported by Healthy Ireland, the Sexual Health Centre has been able to develop a new initiative focused on delivering accessible health and harm reduction services to the wider community.

In The Know

The In The Know manual was developed in 2019. The Sexual Health Centre progressed this project in 2020 with BeLongTo and the HSE Sexual Health and Crisis Pregnancy Programme, to deliver an online platform for In The Know.

The Sexual Health Centre was proud to have established and maintained a number of partnerships aimed at facilitating public access to sexual health services, normalising the topic of sexual health, providing support to vulnerable groups and ensuring advancement of sexual education and the culture of tolerance.

The School of Public Health, UCC

The Sexual Health Centre's Executive Director holds an Adjunct Lecturer post in UCC. This role involves teaching and supervising research projects in the area of sexual health.



The Gay Health Network

The Sexual Health Centre is a proud member of the GHN, a network of organisations and individuals in Ireland promoting HIV prevention and sexual health and wellbeing for gay, bisexual and men who have sex with men (MSM).



The Sexual Health Network

Ireland's first sexual health network was established by the Sexual Health Centre in partnership with the GUM/STI clinic, the HIV clinic in CUH, the Sexual Violence Centre, the Sexual Assault Treatment Unit, Gay Project, LINC and the Youth Health Service. This was extended to include the Department of Public Health (HSE South) and Health Promotion & Improvement (HSE South). The Centre's Executive Director is the Chairperson of the Network.



National Sexual Health Strategy

The Sexual Health Centre is represented in the communications subcommittee and the migrant subcommittee of the Department of Health's National Sexual Health Strategy 2015 - 2020. The Centre's Executive Director is on the Advisory Committee for the National Sexual Health Strategy.



AIDS Action Europe

The Sexual Health Centre is part of a regional network of over 420 organisations across 47 countries, whose vision is for people living with HIV to be free from stigma, discrimination and persecution, and access the necessary prevention, treatment, care and support. The Centre's Executive Director, Martin Davoren was elected to the AIDS Action Europe Steering Committee for the 2021 - 2023 period.

Cork City Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)

The Centre Manager, Catherine Kennedy, has been a community representative on the Cork City LCDC since January 2019.



Cork City Public Participation Network (PPN)

The Centre's Executive Director and Centre Manager are members of the Cork City PPN on behalf of the organisation.



Cork Healthy Cities

As Cork is a designated World Health Organisation (WHO) Healthy City, Cork City Council commits to the community's health and a process and structure to achieve it. The Sexual Health Centre is proud to contribute to Cork Healthy Cities, and the Centre's Executive Director is Deputy Chair of the project.



Cork Local Drugs & Alcohol Task Force

The Sexual Health Centre continued its partnership with CLDATF. The Executive Director sits on the Board of the task force, focused on responding to drug and alcohol issues in Cork city.



The City Centre Coordinating Group

In partnership with St. Fin Barre's Cathedral, Cork Deaf Association and Threshold, the Centre provides sponsorship to the Community Employment Scheme. The Centre's Executive Director is the Chairperson of the Board.

The Executive Director chairs the Sexual Health Action Area of the COMPASS plan for Cork Kerry Community Healthcare. Keep Well initiative

As part of the Government Plan for Living with COVID-19: Resilience and Recovery 2020-2021, the 'Keep Well' initiative was launched to guide people of all ages in minding their physical and mental health and wellbeing. The Sexual Health Centre was delighted to input in to this responsive initiative.



Sex Workers Alliance Ireland (SWAI)

In collaboration with the director of SWAI, the Centre promoted health and safety of sex workers in Ireland, as well as provided free support, rapid HIV testing and condoms to sex workers.



Cork Pride

As part of Cork's first virtual pride festival, the Sexual Health Centre submitted a number of articles to the Cork Pride Festival Magazine. The Centre also hosted a webinar event.



Cork City LGBT Interagency Group

Since 2011, Cork City Council, through its Community Section and Cork City Inter-Agency Group organises Cork LGBTI+ Awareness Week to coincide with international IDAHOT (International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia). The Sexual Health Centre's Senior Health Promotion Officer, Phil Corcoran is a member of the interagency group.

RESEARCH & EVALUATION

Research and evaluation underpin the ethos and service delivery of the organisation. As part of the Executive Director's role in the School of Public Health in University College Cork, he supervised Master's theses focused on barriers to sexual health services, sex work and intimate citizenship. The Centre's team also delivered a number of other significant research projects:

WISE Online

The research element of WISE Online was two-pronged:

- 1. The Centre's Research Officer undertook focus groups with teachers and LGBTI+ youth to understand what they are looking for from sexual health education, what they feel the Social, Personal and Health Education (SPHE) should contain. It was found that teachers wanted comprehensive training and resources to use while teaching; and LGBTI+ youth wanted sexual health education to be more interactive and frequent.
- 2.A systematic review was undertaken to understand best practice in relation to the delivery of LGBTI+ inclusive sexual health. The aim of this review was to synthesise the evidence available regarding LGBTI+ sexual health education for people aged 16 23 years old, from the prospective of both the LGBTI+ youth and those who facilitate their learning. The study concluded that there was a lack of inclusive and comprehensive sexual health education; that there is a need to standardise sexual health curricula to make them LGBTI+ inclusive and to incorporate holistic aspects of health such as pleasure and healthy relationships; and that online approaches should be considered.

In The Know

The Centre's Research Officer undertook a study, 'Examining the efficacy of E-learning: A systematic review and narrative synthesis'. This explored the benefits of E-learning and reasons to employ it, factors which must be considered in the design of any platform and the barriers that exist in E-learning. These findings were used to inform the development of the In The Know online training platform.

Health Research Board (HRB): Definitive Interventions and Feasibility Awards (DIFA)

The Executive Director is a co-Principal Investigator for this research grant, with Dr. Mohamad Saab. As part of a team of national and international researchers and public representatives, they will undertake a study entitled "Enhancing Men's Awareness of Testicular Diseases (E-MAT): A Feasibility Study and Study Within A Trial (SWAT)". By collecting data from young men in Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) clubs in Ireland, and using a bespoke virtual reality intervention, this 30-month project will contribute to young men's awareness of testicular diseases.
