







I am delighted to introduce the 2018 Annual Report on behalf of the clients, volunteers, staff, stakeholders and Board of Directors of the Sexual Health Centre.

Quality service provision and innovation remains at the heart of the organisation. This past year the centre continued to respond to and provide services that match the needs of a growing Cork community. Providing support to people living with or affected by HIV, increasing individual capacity to access healthy relationships and supporting positive sexual health and wellbeing remain at the heart of our organisation, as well as making screening and reproductive health support opportunities more accessible. In 2018, numbers attending for sexual health, pregnancy, HIV, sexuality relationship advice continues to increase highlighting the community need for high quality, professional and inclusive services.

December marked World AIDS Day 2018 and an opportunity for the centre to stand in solidarity with those living with or affected by HIV as well as highlight the need for every individual to know their HIV status. The centre focused on two initiatives. We launched the first national PhotoVoice HIV exhibition. Submissions from around the world (including Ireland, UK and USA) were received and exhibited at St Peters, Cork for the week leading to World AIDS day.

Complementing this, the team delivered Ireland's first World AIDS Day Run in Ballincollig in collaboration with parkrun and the HSE Sexual Health & Crisis Pregnancy Programme. The event highlighted the need for everyone to know their HIV status as well as highlighting the U=U message.

There is an ever increasing awareness of the need for good quality and informative sexual health services for people in Ireland. The organisation continues to partner with statutory and non-statutory agencies to support the sexual health needs of an evolving Ireland. As social advocates for positive social change, the Sexual Health Centre made а number of submissions throughout the year in relation to relationship and sexual education. In addition, the centre's team remain key collaborators and stakeholders number of national and local policy implementation groups. Supporting this, a Cork-based sexual health network was formed in 2018 between the Sexual Health Centre, the STI/GUM clinic and SATU based in the South Infirmary, the HIV Clinic based in Cork University Hospital, the Sexual Violence Centre, LINC, the Cork Gay Project and the Youth Health Service. This network provides a forum to share knowledge, highlight services, advocate for and better respond to the client.

The ongoing work of the Sexual Health Centre would not be possible without the staff, volunteers and board of the organisation. I would like to commend the team in delivering an exciting range of services, advocacy campaigns and policy recommendations in 2018. Their continued determination to provide high quality, equitable, accessible and inclusive sexual health services is crucial to ensuring the fundamental human rights of everyone to experience positive sexual experiences and health are delivered.

INTRODUCTION

The Sexual Health Centre Ltd. is a Not for Profit, Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) that was established in July 1987 as Cork Aids Alliance. The vision of the organisation is for a future where sexual health is recognised as an integral part of life, barriers to access sexual health services are removed, social stigma and discrimination are challenged, each individual feels safe to express their sexuality, and people make informed decisions regarding their sexual wellbeing and treat each other's life choices with the utmost respect.

In achieving this, the Sexual Health Centre sets a mission to

"always provide the most up-to-date and comprehensive information regarding the topics of sexual health, wellbeing and sexuality, to offer a safe space for individuals to express their concerns without fear, to get non-biased answers to their most intimate questions, to normalise the perception of sexual health and sexuality and to facilitate a nation-wide acceptance of positive sexual health and sexuality as an integral part of life."

Our values include Dignity, Confidentiality, Accessibility, Safe Space, Non-Biased, Everyday, Going All the Way, Partnership, Transparency, Quality. The Sexual Health Centre believes that everyone has a right to positive sexual health and aims to provide high quality, inclusive and client-focused services, focused on wellbeing, healthy relationships, HIV and sexual health, to every member of the community. For over 30 years, the Sexual Health Centre has supported the community through the most innovative initiatives and will continue to do so in the future.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW



The Sexual Health Centre introduced a number of new initiatives that reflected and enhanced the existing work being carried out in the area of sexual health, including HIV mentoring, sexual health advice and counselling for young LGBTI+ people and capacity building for professionals to increase their confidence when dealing with sexual health issues.

For the first time, the national campaign for World AIDS Day was led out of Cork by the Sexual Health Centre with the support of the HSE Sexual Health & Crisis Pregnancy Programme.

This culminated in the World AIDS Day Run, in association with parkrun Ballincollig, which attracted over 350 participants. The local focus of the national campaign helped bring Cork to the forefront of the topic and give people living with or affected by HIV in the Cork area a direct opportunity to express their views, volunteer, campaign and collectively advocate.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW



As part of the World AIDS Day campaign, the Centre organised the first Irish PhotoVoice HIV project.

The aim of this project was to give people living with or affected by HIV from around the world (including Ireland, UK and USA) an opportunity to express what HIV meant to them in the form of a photograph. Entries were displayed in St Peter's for the week leading to World AIDS Day.

The PhotoVoice HIV opening night also featured the launch of a qualitative report on the Lived Experience of HIV-Positive Young Adults in Cork by Aoife Burke. The report focused on the reality of being a young person in Cork diagnosed and living with HIV. This is a previously unexplored area of research, as the vast majority of current reports focus on ageing with HIV. The campaign received widespread media attention, and the launch night was highly successful.





Nature of inquiries 2018




HEALTH PROMOTION



In 2018, we facilitated 948 counselling sessions in total.










CRISIS PREGNANCY



Crisis pregnancy sessions 2017 VS 2018




HIV & SEXUAL HEALTH SUPPORT


In 2018, we facilitated 479 counselling sessions around HIV and sexual health in total.

DCYA CAPACITY BUILDING GRANTS

In 2018, the Sexual Health Centre was proud to be awarded two DCYA capacity building grants.

The first allowed us to offer professional counselling to young people from LGBTI+ community over the course of 8 weeks. The counselling was provided by Mr. John Fleming.

The second allowed us to introduce a training programme aimed at increasing confidence among youth workers and professionals when responding to queries and concerns from service users in relation to sexual health. The programme was delivered by Ms. Anna Keogh.



STI screening inquiries in 2018






RAPID HIV TESTING










